Editorial: Apartments Without Off-street Car Parking & Car Ownership Rates

As has become abundantly clear in conversations about the new apartment buildings cropping up around our part of town, many people feel that finding on-street car parking is already difficult in our neighborhoods. Why is this? Whose cars are these?

One way to answer this question is to look at census data on car ownership in Sunnyside. Amazingly, this is possible without getting up from one's chair. The American Community Survey 2010 results have recently been published online, and afford a comparison to 2000 that is instructive. Sunnyside includes census tract 13.01 (west of SE Cesar Chavez Blvd/SE 39th), and about half of census tract 14. The shortest summary is that the number of renters and owners who do not own a car appears to be increasing. The percentage of renter households without a vehicle went from 26 to 32 percent (west of 39th) and from 26 to 28 percent (east of 39th) over this past decade. Owneroccupied households went from 3 to 6 percent and from 2 to 5 percent, respectively. In those two census tracts, which include portions of the Richmond neighborhood, almost 200 renter households "got rid of their car" over that period. I put the phrase in guotes because we don't know if these were car-free people moving into the neighborhood or existing residents who gave up cars.

We don't know the specific reasons for this shift in Sunnyside, but our neighborhood's access to frequent bus lines, the level of Zipcar saturation, and the widely noted increase in the population of those who rely heavily on bicycles for transportation are all plausible contributors. Of course, gas prices also have risen a lot over the past decade, and, as has been in the news, younger people in the U.S. are no longer automatically getting drivers licenses, buying cars, or driving as many miles as older generations. Some of these trends are expected to continue or even accelerate.

The addition of another building (in the case of Sunnyside) at SE 30th and Hawthorne, which has a TriMet

bus stop in front of it, and which will include secure off-street bike parking but no off-street car parking, conjures for some people the end of decent car parking prospects in that area. But is this necessarily true? Will the people who move into that building's 50 apartments all have cars as has been suggested?

I think that highly unlikely. A similar building in the Irvington neighborhood, built by the same developer, is reported to have roughly 16 cars for 50 units, or roughly one car for every three households. If homeowners in Sunnyside achieved those car ownership rates, the existing problem of limited on-street car parking would evaporate.

The shift away from cars is proceeding very slowly in our neighborhood. But there is no reason in my mind to think that it couldn't accelerate. We had a well-attended roundtable discussion on the topic of living car-free a few years ago as part of Transition Sunnyside's lecture and film series. People were curious about the subject, and eager to learn from those who live in Portland without a car.



Fair Procedures in Fluoridation Decision Advocated

Regardless of how each of us feels personally about the fluoridation issue, I think we can all agree that the city should follow fair procedures in decision-making. I believe that the City of Portland Public Involvement Principles, adopted by the City of Portland on August 4, 2010, were deliberately compromised by Commissioner Randy Leonard and his colleagues on the City Council when they approved fluoridation in Portland's drinking water. Nor did City Council seem to follow the spirit of the consortium concept for use, when the City of Gresham, Tigard, and Gresham Water Districts (all purchasers of Bull Run drinking water) were not informed of the Portland Water Bureau's fluoridation plans prior to reading "Mayor Adams' endorsement to inject fluoride into a water supply serving about 900,000 customers" in an Oregonian article.

Fluoridation is an issue the public deserves the right to carefully consider and then vote on. On September 12, City Council voted to fluoridate the water, and three days later more than 175 people were prepared to gather signatures in an effort to give the public the right to vote on this on the 2014 ballot. Clean Water Portland advocates now have roughly 21 days to gather signatures from registered voters living within Portland city limits. 

We conduct site visits with landowners and provide information, resources (wholesale prices on plants, mulch, gardening tools), and rewards for certification (gift cards, free tickets, etc.). For \$25, landowners receive a site visit, report, and certification sign.

Many of your neighbors, myself included, have already signed up with this program and worked to create beautiful, lush yards full of native plants, singing birds, and buzzing pollinators. If you are interested in learning more about the program or want to sign up, I will be at the October SNA meeting with information and applications.
