Emergency Preparedness Tip of the Month: Store Water *By Lee Greer, SNA Emergency Preparedness Committee*

Our water supply could become unavailable or contaminated after an earthquake or other disaster, so have an emergency supply on hand. A three-day supply (one gallon per person per day) is an often-cited minimum. A two-week supply, or more, is better. You can buy bottled water, buy containers designed for water storage, or use well-washed plastic soda bottles. Don't use milk or bleach jugs. You can easily store two-liter or one-gallon bottles in little used spaces, like the backs of closets or cupboards. If your bed is high off the floor, you could put bottles under it. Or how about behind the couch? Don't store your bottled water directly on a concrete floor, because concrete could cause the plastic to deteriorate and contaminate the supply. More about water next month.

Tips for Waterwise Gardening in Sunnyside

Beautiful lawns and gardens are one of the things that make Sunnyside such a great place to live. Local residents also have a strong commitment to preserving the community's natural resources and Sunnyside gardeners frequently ask for new and better ways to save water while keeping their gardens green and healthy in the dry summer months.

The Regional Water Providers Consortium (RWPC) has free resources to help Sunnyside residents do just that.

Access RWPC's Weekly Watering Number (www.conserveh2o.org) to learn how many inches of water your lawn or garden needs. You can sign up to receive the watering number by e-mail each week.

You can also reduce outdoor water use by selecting low-water and native plants, and using smart watering techniques. RWPC offers plant guides,



information about lawn alternatives, and how-to videos on its Web site (www.conserveh2o.org/using-waterefficiently-outdoors).

Here are RWPC's Top Five waterwise tips:

- Water before 10 a.m. or after 6 p.m. when temperatures are cooler.
- Adjust sprinklers so that they are watering your lawn and garden, not the street.
- Water in several short sessions to allow for better absorption and prevent runoff.
- Adjust your mower to a higher setting to shade roots and help retain soil moisture.
- Group plants with similar watering needs together.

RWPC is offering free outdoor watering gauge kits, with a water gauge and timer, from July 1 to August 10. Kits are available while supplies last—one per customer—to metro-area residents who receive water service from one of the Consortium members.

Movie in the Park: Free and Live By Tim Brooks

On Saturday, August 17, Planet of Dinosaurs—featuring the Blue Cranes performing the live soundtrack, Willamette Radio Workshop voicing the dialog, and Foley artists creating the sound effects—will be shown in Sewallcrest Park.

Planet of Dinosaurs is set in the distant future, when the spaceship Odyssey and its crew crash on a prehistoric planet inhabited by dinosaurs. This is the story of their epic struggle for survival. The Blue Cranes are a highly acclaimed jazz improv quintet, straddling the line between jazz and post-rock.

The entire soundtrack will be performed LIVE during the film. All of the dialog, music, and sounds for the film will be performed in front of the audience.

A special feature at this year's movie will be a mini-dinosaur zoo by Mr. Lizard's Mobile Reptile Zoo. There will also be a great raffle and food carts. The film begins at dusk (approximately 8:30 p.m.), but get there early, as this is a popular event.

SNA is sponsoring this event together with Richmond and HAND neighborhood associations, Portland Parks and Recreation, and the Portland Parks Foundation. The movie is part of the city's Summer Movies in the Parks program, but it is the only live soundtrack performance. It is funded by grants, sponsorships, and donations, including a grant from the Multnomah County Cultural Coalition and Oregon Cultural Trust. To donate to this event and receive an exclusive

close-in neighborhoods. Sunnyside has great access to restaurants, entertainment, public transit, grocery stores, libraries, parks, and downtown. Ours is a walkable, bikeable, familyfriendly neighborhood situated among several other similarly endowed communities. Summer Tree Care

Portland enjoyed a beautiful, sunny, and relatively dry spring this year. Now we are fully into summer and the trees in our yards and parking strips need water. Trees planted within the last three years are especially vulnerable. It takes at least a year per inch of trunk diameter for trees to become established. For less established trees, the rule of thumb is to provide 10 gallons of water per week for every inch of trunk diameter. To gauge trunk diameter, measure four and a half feet up from the tree's base.

Water deeply. A slow and steady drip is more effective than regular shallow sprinkling. You can use a slow-release watering bag. Ask at your local nursery, choose from a number of styles and makes on Amazon (\$12 to \$20 plus shipping), or contact Friends of Trees.

Prune trees when they are young. It's better to be safe than sorry like this home in the Montavilla neighborhood whose tree lost a major limb in early June (see photo). In addition, a delay in pruning can transform a 25-cent cut

Many wonderful volunteer Sunnyside residents distribute the Neighborhood News. into a \$250 pruning job. Remove tree branches that are less than seven and a half feet over the sidewalk, less than 11 feet over residential streets, and 14 feet over arterials. Before pruning street trees, apply for a permit at www.portlandoregon.gov/ parks/58764. This site also has a link to Portland's pruning standards.

Street and yard trees provide shade, beauty, and habitat for birds and other
