Sunnyside's First Heritage Tree

The European beech (Fagus sylvatica) in the back yard of 4343 SE Madison was added to the Portland Heritage Tree List in 1998. Its 19.4-foot circumference supports a canopy 90 feet wide and 70 feet high, giving it a greater width than other heritage beech trees listed. Heritage trees are considered of "special importance to the city" because of their "age, size, type, historical association, or horticultural value."

How old do you think this tree might be? It is in the backyard of a home built in 1910 but the neighboring home to the west was constructed in 1896. Other adjacent homes date from 1907 to 1912. Since it is not native, it was likely planted over 100 years ago. European beeches live 150-200 years, sometimes 300 years, so this tree should continue to grace its neighborhood for many more years. If you visit, the best views are from SE 44th Avenue.

Underlying...what? *Michael Molinaro, SNA Land Use Committee*

By now I think we all generally understand the idea of lot splitting. We can see it in a few instances in Sunnyside under construction right now. It's fairly easy to figure this out in our R2.5 zoning, which is the majority of the residential areas in Sunnyside—a 5,000-square-foot lot gets split into two lots.

Where it gets tricky is in the areas that are zoned R5. This generally means that a lot needs to be 5,000 square feet. But in the zoning ordinance there is a concept called "underlying lot lines," which allows the division of a property based on lot lines that were established when Sunnyside or any neighborhood was first platted out. Sunnyside was originally platted with 2,500-square-foot lots. Many houses were initially constructed on multiple lots. Often these houses were placed in the middle of a large lot. These properties are very desirable now, to remove the existing house and develop multiple houses.

So even in zoning areas that are R5 we might find underlying lot lines on lots that could be divided into more parcels. You can log on to the Portland Chronicle and click the tab for underlying lot lines map to see how your property might be divided.

Recycling Tip of the Month: Let's Talk Lunch!

Fall is an excellent time to apply "reduce, reuse, and recycle" to our back-to-school and work lunch routines. The trick is to avoid one-time throwaway packaging. Cellophane, plastic wrap, plastic utensils, freezerboxed meals, mixed plastic containers, containers too small to be recycled curbside, and contaminated paper products create trash destined for the landfill. Reducing or eliminating their use will make a huge difference over time. Worldcentric.org estimates 40 billion plastic utensils are used every year in the United States. Most are thrown out after just one use and can take up to 1,000 years to degrade in a landfill!

New reusable products can make taking your lunch easy while keeping food hot, cold, or both. For starters, carry your own water bottle, coffee mug, a portable Spork, and a bandana or cotton cloth napkin and make a big difference in reducing one-time-use waste.

Local grocery stores carry portable lunch packs and bags, sacks, boxes, snack and sandwich wraps, and reusable containers. Find one that works for your situation-thermal, separating portions, plastic free, highly portable, or compact. Mirador Community Store at SE 21st and Division (1.5 miles from Sunnyside) has an entire wall display of earthfriendly products, including natural wax paper, bamboo, and cotton, as well as stainless steel bento containers, stackables, and Mason jar accessories. Visit www.reuseit.com for ideas on packing a waste-free lunch. Of course, a brown paper bag or a tote purchased resale works just fine and you don't have to worry if it gets lost!

If you enjoy the downtown Portland food carts, please check out www. gobox.pdx.com. Go Box is a reusable container system for food from the carts. Bowls and utensils are picked up by bike each day, washed, and returned the next day to participating carts. GoBox is part of the solution to some 60,000 disposable food containers used by Portland's food carts each month.




