Wish Cycling

"Wish cycling" is a widely used term that describes what happens when we decide what to put in the recycle bin. Sometimes we are not quite sure and it is easy to place questionable items in the recycling bin with the hope that they can somehow be recycled. We might be communicating what we would like to see recycled, or maybe we don't understand our choices, or perhaps we are recycling the same items that were accepted where we used to live, or just hoping that the material can somehow be recovered. Anything's better than the landfill, right?

Well, no. You've probably heard the phrase, "When in doubt, throw it out." Wish cycling can be a costly practice. Items found in the blue bins that cannot be accepted must be hand picked out of the stream of materials by recycling workers. Plastic films might clog the machinery and cause shutdowns. Plastic yogurt or cottage cheese lids can slide in with the paper and contaminate what was to be a bale of paper for recycling. Glass can break and cause injury. Food-contaminated paper (used paper plates, take-out containers, etc.) could result in clean paper being sent to the landfill.

Here are some easy ways to be more accurate when recycling in our southeast neighborhood:

- Consult The Curbsider, visit www.portlandoregon.gov/bps, or call the Hotline at 503-823-7202.
- Call your local hauler for the latest information about what they accept.
- Call the Metro Hotline at 503-234-3000 or go to www.oregonmetro.gov to send a message or search the Find-A-Recycler Tool for the closest location that will accept your recyclable items, hazardous materials, or items for reuse.
- Visit www.farwestrecycling.com to learn what can be accepted beyond curbside recycling at our nearby local depot.
