Residents Address Sunnyside Neighborhood Association on Homelessness

At the November general meeting we heard from a group of Sunnyside neighbors who have been attending the Livability Committee meetings and wished to address their concerns to the Board. We devoted an hour to this group's desire to engage the Board on a list of demands vis-à-vis the homeless people with whom we now share this neighborhood. This group felt that the panel discussion in October did not offer answers to the pressing problems they experience. We listened and discussed some of the demands, which were laid out in a letter passed out at the meeting, but the conversation kept drifting back to the demand that SE Uplift stop allowing camping in the parking strip in front of their building. The chief demand was for everyone to inform any homeless people camped in front of their property that they must move along after 72 hours. As I understood the thinking behind this idea, this approach would motivate those living on the streets to seek out services that will help them out of this situation.

The trouble with this approach—as I tried to point out in the meeting—is that those offering services to the homeless in our region are either at, or over, capacity. According to Kaia Sand, the Executive Director of Street Roots, whom I asked about this: "the TPI shelters (Laurelwood, River District, Walnut Park, etc) all have waiting lists, and individual people can't

even get on those lists (they have to be referred)." As we learned at the panel discussion in October, Oregon ranks 49th out of the 50 states in access to mental health services.

As much as we may wish there to be institutional capacity to fix this broken system, we are in fact in a much deeper hole than that. With different priorities, adequate funding, more services, less inequality, and fewer of the drivers that attract so many new people to our city, many of the dimensions of this problem could be tackled more aggressively, and eventually solved, but in the meantime today, tomorrow, and next week-I am afraid it is up to us as neighbors, as people—as folks who if our luck ran out could ourselves be homeless in a week or a month—to muddle through. support or join those who are helping in small ways, find or invent our own local solutions. While asking every homeless person camped in our midst to move along may feel promising to some, based on what I have learned, this does not seem likely to lead people off the streets and into housing any more than has the very expensive sweeps program.

SES Annual Tree Recycling Fundraiser Returns

The US Census comes to Sunnyside

Every ten years, as mandated by the United States Constitution, our nation collects an accurate accounting of the number of people residing within any given area of the country through the work of the Decennial Census.

With this accounting, local, county, state, and federal organizations and agencies gain access to a statistical representation of their communities, which informs the apportionment of over \$675 billion annually in federal funds, district lines for political representation, and the number of Congresspeople each state receives. Beyond federal funding for schools, roads, hospitals (and much more), businesses, nonprofits, and government agencies use the statistical population data of the Census to plan their services. Anyone seeking to understand the populations they serve within a geographic area can make use of the data the Census generates every ten years.

In order to complete the work of the Decennial, the Census Bureau is hiring hundreds of workers locally to both conduct field work and support those field workers from the office. We're hiring now in Multnomah County, paying \$18 - \$20/hour for field positions and \$14.50 - \$18.50/hour for office positions.

These are great paying jobs with flexible hours, paying weekly, and with paid training. Whether you're looking to grab some extra cash, or want to be a part of history, if you're 18 or older (or will be by March 2020), a US citizen, and have an email address, the Census Bureau invites you to join us in this important work that we've conducted since 1790. It's an experience you'll never forget!

Neighborhood Watch Renamed

Neighborhood Watch Training has ended. Neighbors Together training has begun.

What is "Neighbors Together"? According to their website "Neighbors Together goes beyond the traditional 'watch' approach still connecting neighbors but with an emphasis on community building."

The Neighbors Together organizers will handle the training the same as they did for the Neighborhood Watch, at a private home for as few as five neighbors. However they will also train larger groups. If people from several blocks attend a given training, there should be an appointee who will coordinate those additional blocks, and keep them updated. Attendees' contact information

will be the responsibility of the block organizer or appointed neighbor.

One improvement with the new program is that businesses, parks, apartments, and multi-use buildings can now be in the same block group as homeowners and attend the same training meeting. You just need to have a large enough space. Training can be on any day of the week or on the weekend if the conveners are given advanced notice, but the best days are Tuesday thru Thursday. Meetings can start any time between 2 and 7 pm and will last for 60 to 90 minutes.

Neighbors Together will do presentations about the new program at Neighborhood Association meetings to make the associations aware of this program. Lights on December 15 – 31 from 6 pm to 11 pm

PEDESTRIANS ONLY NIGHTS are December 15, 16, and 17 (Sunday, Monday and Tuesday)

In the event of additional, unplanned closures due to large crowds, updates will be posted to Twitter, Facebook, and peacocklane.org pages. Those who must see the lights from a car are encouraged to check online before visiting.

Free Cocoa and Cider

The Cocoa Booth is open December 15 – 24 from 6 pm until sold out (generally around 8 pm). Cocoa and cider are provided free of charge, but donations of cash and canned goods are accepted at the cocoa booth when open. This year a portion of the cocoa booth proceeds will be donated locally to Morrison Child and Family Services – SAGE Youth Residential program (https://morrisonkids.org/programs/residential/sage-youth-residential-program/)

Transportation and Parking

Traffic can become quite heavy in the area during the lights season. Visitors to Peacock Lane are encouraged to view the lights by foot, if possible, for the best experience. Utilize free street parking several blocks away or public transportation (TriMet buses 15, 75, and 20 have stops within a few blocks; http://trimet.org/go/cgi-bin/plantrip.cgi). Please be respectful of our neighbors when parking in the area. Note: Do Not park in the Walgreens lot; they maintain their lot for their customers only.


