

Holding the 2020 Sunnyside Neighborhood Board Elections

We are planning to hold our annual board elections on Thursday, July 9th, at our usual meeting time of 7pm, two months later than we normally would. Other neighborhoods across the city are experimenting with ways to accomplish an election that conforms to each neighborhood's bylaws as well as avoids risks to anyone's health. We considered (1) a largely digital approach, (2) a hybrid video-conference-based election combined with a staffed ballot box, as well as (3) an outdoor venue using small adjustments to our tried-and-true inperson procedures.

Our hope and intention is to conduct our elections outside in the fresh air adjacent to S.E. Uplift's building at 3534 SE Main St. The parking lot and mini-park offer a good amount of space, and the proximity to the building makes staging this relatively straightforward.

The basic format will resemble a typical election where candidates briefly introduce themselves and the membership (anyone who lives in the neighborhood, owns a business here, or is the designated representative of a business or community group or organization located in Sunnyside) votes by paper ballot. The votes will be collected and tallied by our liaison from S.E. Uplift, Christina Estime, who has helped us with

past elections. We are excited to make this work and hope you will join us.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT - Three ways shelter in place has invited us to get involved in our neighborhood

We are now several weeks into shelter in place. Our houses have become our workplace, school, cafe, bar, etc. There are plenty of challenges, from missing our favorite public spots to unemployment to losing people we love. Though we've likely now settled into some kind of rhythm that, for the moment, feels "normal", we are wondering what is ahead, how things have changed, how we've changed.

One positive effect from this experience is that staying close to home has illuminated our interdependence and connectedness with one another. Whether we like it or not, we are neighbors. And as it turns out, we need each other. We must figure out how to at minimum co-exist, and hopefully work together for the collective good.

Sheltering in place can produce deeper

engagement and investment right where we are. Here are three ways I see this showing up in this COVID19 moment.

First, now that we must be hyper-local we've been walking more. The slower pace allows us to notice the changes and shifts, maybe even things (and people) we haven't noticed before. For example, as I passed through the piazza at SE 33rd and Yamhill, I was curious about future plans for that public art space. That led me to a Google search and I eventually signed up to volunteer. What are you noticing? What are you curious about? How might that be a way to get involved in the neighborhood?

Second, while we must maintain a physical distance, we recognize our need for social connection. Recent statistics tell us we have been engaging less and less with our neighbors. However this moment might force some of us to engage with those closest in proximity to us - even if they aren't, let's say, our preference. This is good! We might learn about the ways COVID19 is affecting those different than us, we might be compelled to take action. We might begin to grow a deeper appreciation for those who work at the grocery stores and own small businesses. How can we support them as essential members of our neighborhood? And with those we already like and love, we've come up with creative ways to stay connected whether it's through distanced happy hours in the streets or online meet ups.

Third, recognizing our connectedness to one another as neighbors invites us to collaborate for a healthy, equitable, and flourishing community. Elections are coming up for the Sunnyside Neighborhood Association board, seats are empty. I personally hope we have multiple candidates and increased voter turn out. We have the opportunity and power to benefit from investing and engaging in our neighborhood. What can you imagine? What do you hope for? How can we create and build together?


Delivery Help Needed!
